A Time for All Ages Building Cairns Leslie

Stacking rocks, or building cairns is an ancient and timeless practice found in many cultures, used to mark

paths, burial sites, mountain summits, and other landmarks or sacred places.

The process of stacking stones requires patience, focus and perseverance, qualities which can help with goals and challenges.

Building cairns can be used to reach a sense of calm, grounding, inner peace or meditation.

Cairns can be used as an altar, where each rock can represent an intention of gratitude.

The act of carefully balancing stones can represent the **pursuit** of inner balance, harmony and stability in life.

Some people use the stacking process to focus their intentions or offer prayers, with each stone representing a specific thought or hope.

By interacting with the natural elements of stones, stacking can be seen as a way to connect to the earth and its energy.

You will find flat stones available on the floor and you are welcome to also use a stone from the bowls. I invite

everyone forward to build a miniature cairn, allowing the practice to move you in whatever spiritual way speaks to you. Please place your cairn where it will not be in the path where folks will be walking. We will build our cairns in silence to allow each builder the space to create in contemplation.

After There is both a permanence and an impermanence to cairns. Wind and floods as well as other natural events can cause a cairn to fall, but the stones the cairn is made of usually remain in their original form. It is considered impolite, dangerous or even illegal for anyone but the builder to destroy a cairn. These miniature cairns will need to be removed following the service, so if you would like to tear down your own cairn, please do so during the postlude.

If anyone decides to build a cairn during the remainder of the service, you may do so.

The power of a stone in the hand can be a tangible way to concentrate on our intentions, joys, sorrows and prayers.

By observing its attributes, its sparkles or cracks or striations, its smoothness or jagged edges, it may whisper an answer to whatever the moment stirs in us.
